#### SEA-LEVEL RISE AND CLIMATE CHANGE

"Modelling now very clearly shows that even if carbon dioxide emissions were rapidly reduced today, the climate system has enough momentum to continue to cause sealevel rises at their current unrelenting pace for at least the next 150 years." Oceans around Australia are forecast to rise between 2.8 and 5.1°C by 2090, contributing to longer and more frequent marine heatwaves that harm sea life.

### **82cm**


Global sea levels are expected to increase by 45 to 82 cm by 2090, posing the threat of flooding to coastal areas.





Seawaters around Australia are becoming more acidic, as the oceans absorb some of the CO2 released by human activities.


of Queensland in 2019 suffered from prolonged and severe drought conditions. In 2017, the figure was 87%.





Droughts can have wide ranging effects on humans and their health, including impacts on nutrition, infectious diseases, respiratory conditions caused by air pollution, and on mental health.
