#### **Activities**

# Remembering

- Complete a crossword puzzle and word search. (Refer worksheet)
- Complete a 'Who said that'? Activity. (Refer worksheet)

#### **Understanding**

- Complete a story map activity based on the story. (Refer worksheet)
- The authors use Australian colloquialisms (..and pigs might fly.. Page 8) as well as an English dialect (for the soldiers and settlers) and the Trumpalars language ('oft' instead of often on page 14) in the story. Illustrate and discuss some of the language used in the book.
- Complete a 'Y Chart' on an interesting episode in the story such as when Cass and Carl first explore the tunnels. (Refer worksheet)

#### Analysis

 Select parts of the story that were the funniest, saddest, happiest and most unbelievable. (Compare them with those determined by other students) (Refer worksheet)

- Complete a character web on a character from the story. (Or a literary sociogram identifying the relationships between a various characters. (Refer worksheets)
- Read and compare using a 'T Chart' other 'time shifting' stories such as: Tuck Everlasting, Tom's Midnight Garden, Stig of the Dump and Playing Betty Bow.



# **Applying**

- Create a diorama of the scene where Carl loses his glasses. (Chapter 27)
- Create a PowerPoint presentation on early Sydney
- Complete a Venn diagram comparing 1816 Sydney and 1870 Sydney. (Refer worksheet)
- Pause during the story to suggest how certain events might turn out. (For example how might Cass escape from the soldiers?)
- Create a comic strip about Cass and Carl's first encounter with Mary or the scene where Carl loses his glasses and is almost caught by Mrs. Valchase. (Refer worksheet)
- As Mr Benson write a newspaper story about the last minute reprieve for the Fig tree. (Include the discovery of the old will and include an extract from it. Refer page114) (Refer worksheet)

#### Creative

- Create a wanted for Mary or missing persons poster for Cass and Carl. (Refer worksheet)
- Design a no trespassers sign for Penbriton's Factory.
- Create your own pledge to protect or defend something/someone.

Paint a picture of the Trumpalar (refer page 13 for a description)

#### **Evaluation**

• Children design a new cover to the book and on it and include a blurb giving their personal point of view on the book with supporting arguments and observations. (Refer worksheet)



# Time shifting

- **1.** Experiencing an event from the past or future in the present moment.
- 2. Influencing past or future events.
- **3.** Experiencing loops in time, in which a sequence of events repeats.
- **4.** A form of reality shift involving time.

**Time shifting** is a relatively new term which describes the ancient phenomenon observed by shamans, yogis, and other spiritual adepts capable of accessing, experiencing and influencing events in the past, present, and future. Time shifts are reality shifts in which the dimension of reality we know as "time" undergoes some kind of observable transformation. Time shifts appear to us in such a way that we can observe them in the form of time loops, time travel, time slowing down, and retrocausality.








# **Literary Sociogram**



**TRUMPER PARK** - Edgecliff - Originally Hampden Park Oval, it was built on reclaimed swamp - Glenmore Brook runs down and under its middle. It was named in honour of Viscount Hampden, Governor of New South Wales (1895-99) - Hampden Street alongside the park was originally named Ebenezer Street. The name of park was changed in 1931 to honour one of Paddington's cricketing heroes, Victor Trumper (1877-1915).



# Australian themed art tasks

# **Sunset/Silhouette pictures**

# **SUPPLIES:**

- Red, yellow & blue watercolour
- Soft leaded pencil
- black card
- Watercolour paper
- Scissors, glue

# WHAT TO DO:


wash watercolour paint over regular white paper. Paint 'sunset colours' in strips.



Set wet paper aside. Using a soft-leaded pencil, draw a frame around the perimeter of a black piece of paper. Draw a simple scene inside the frame. It helps to have some parts of the scene touch the frame.

Then with a white oil pastel or crayon, Children trace around the 'negative space'.

Cut along white oil pastel lines. Glue onto dry watercolour paper.





# **Concertina pictures**

# **SUPPLIES:**

- Two Australia themed calendar pictures
- A3 card
- Scissors, ruler, glue

# WHAT TO DO:

Concertina fold the A3 card. Using a ruler and pencil rule lines (make 7 strips) on the back of each picture. Cut the strips out and glue them onto the alternate folds of the A3 card.





# Zig Zag pictures

# **SUPPLIES:**

- One Australia themed calendar pictures
- A3 coloured card
- Scissors, ruler, glue

# WHAT TO DO:

On the back of a calendar page rule zig zag lines. (They can also be wavy lines) Cut along the lines and glue onto A3 card leaving a zig zag gap.

















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
